The low lines of the sofa and lamps don't get in the way of the view.

An L-shaped sofa offers a lot of seating in a compact form and subtly differentiates living and dining areas.

Andrée Putman's Sitting on a Cloud chair is covered in durable, stain-resistant Perennials awning material. A sleek ceiling soffit holds recessed halogen lights, which provide both overall and directed light as needed.

Sullivan and Bednar ditched the dowdy draperies for luxurious ivory Ultrasuede banded with mustard yellow and navy stripes, which echo the big, bold lines of the window mullions. For a more dramatic effect, the designers took the curtains all the way to the floor.

he wraparound windows were shrouded with heavy curtains. A clunky radiator cover bumped right into the love seat, which was way too small for the room. Designers Christina Sullivan and Susan Bednar of Tocar knew immediately that they wanted to let in the light and streamline the furniture in their client's fiving room. "If you're lucky enough to live on the 23rd floor of a Manhattan high-rise, you have to be able to see the view," says Sullivan. The Mondrianesque pattern of the window mullions is the strongest architectural element in the room, so the designers riffed on the artist's bold strokes and primary colors to create their own graphically sophisticated scheme. Modernist classics like the Eero Saarinen coffee table and the Warren Platner dining table continue the fine lines, fully integrating a space used for both dining and lounging. •
