ll musicians know that when it comes to feeling inspired, the right furnishings can make all the difference. With that in mind, longtime clients in Greenwich turned to Chris Roughan to create a fun, edgy music room for their three children.

Roughan was completely on-board. "I'm a music aficionado myself, so it was really fun to work on this room," she says. With one child playing the piano, one playing bass guitar and another playing rhythm guitar, the clients had very specific design requests—they wanted an area for the children to play their music, a separate sitting area to relax and watch TV, and materials that could hold their own against the kids and their friends.

And although this space was designed for their children, the adults feel equally at home. "The clients wanted everything to be very durable, but they also wanted it to be chic," says Roughan. "If they have a dinner party and want to hang out in here, they could."
