of designer Christina
Roughan to the idea of
enjoying an outdoor
room even in the heart of

winter. "My client called, and she and her husband wanted to create an outdoor space for four seasons," says Roughan, of Roughan Interiors in New York City and Connecticut. "He had been impressed that even when he was in a business meeting in the mountains, he was often in a glass space enjoying an amazing view. He wanted a glass addition for their backyard."

Though not in the Swiss Alps, the clients' Georgian-style Greenwich, Connecticut, home boasts its own enviable view. Beyond capturing the waterfront scenery, the couple had another directive. "They sat me down and said, 'We really want our family to use it," Roughan says. "They wanted a place to have fun and to enjoy life with their four children and extended family."

Conversations about a chic and friendly space for graduation parties, holiday gatherings, and family movie nights under the stars unfolded, along with requests for an adjoining firepit area and an outdoor kitchen with dining space.

Teaming with Tim O'Malley of Argus Development LLC and architect Cormac Byrne, Roughan collaborated on a flexible 1,000-square-foot glass enclosure accessible through the dining room's French doors. Three walls of movable bifold glass with screens surround versatile furnishings selected for year-round entertaining, dining, and relaxation.

"It can be anything they want it to be," Roughan says. The family can open all the doors on summer days, use screens in the evenings, or enclose the entire heatable space when the snow falls, staying toasty thanks to a heated floor. The multipurpose, welcoming space provides room for working from home, an intimate dinner party beneath dimmable lights, or a 100-plus-person cocktail reception that spills onto the lawn.

Designing for maximum versatility and comfort required constant attention to what was beautiful, functional, durable, and in sync with how the family lives. Roughan does admit pushing for the draperies a bit, appeasing any concerns about blocking the view with a tieback option, though she favors the dreamy visual of them flowing in a breeze.

The designer explains that unlike an interior room, this space portrays a totally different backdrop and lifestyle spring, summer, fall, and winter. "The outside dictates. I just follow that by changing up pillows and small details," she says.

All that attention to detail translates to happy clients, Roughan says. "It's been so lived in that it has so many stories already. It's an incredibly special space."
